our last edition, we highlighted many of the positive attributes of Mooroolbark that Mooroolbark residents had mentioned to some of the members of MAP Mooroolbark. You'll recall that MAP exists to collect up-to-date information about our township, which can help all of us plan for a better future (for more information about MAP Mooroolbark see text box).

MAP has recently developed plans for providing Mooroolbark residents (and anyone else, for that matter), with current, public information about our town through a free, online Community Directory. Imagine a community-based website, specifically designed by Mooroolbark residents to deliver information relevant to our township! Imagine a community website uncluttered by advertising - neither Shire nor business

driven - a website developed by the community to benefit the entire community.

In a few months we're planning that www.mooroolbark.org.au will be sufficiently developed for you to access. By visiting the home page, and using the search engine, you will be able to rapidly access the information you need. It might be up-to-date listings of doctors, or appliance repairers... schools or churches... sporting clubs or service organisations... where to eat, buy a bike, or find a piano teacher...

In addition, our voluntary webmasters will regularly update the home page. It will publicise future community activities, as well as report on recent events, in ways that will help to foster a greater sense of community identity in Mooroolbark. And of course. there will be easily accessible links to other

helpful sites, such as the Shire of Yarra Ranges, local Members of Parliament, hospitals and emergency services, businesses and so on.

We plan the home page to look something like this (see above).

Comments So Far

- The green toning of the home page reflects the attractive 'greenness' of the Mooroolbark environment
- Layout is not cluttered
- The home page is easy to negotiate
- The site contains sufficiently interesting graphics, but not too many to retard downloading
- Search engine is prominent

In a few months we're planning that www.mooroolbark.org.au will be sufficiently developed for you to use.

We would appreciate your comments about the artist's 'mock-up' of our homepage, to help us make the site as 'user-friendly' and helpful, as possible.

As you may imagine, there remains a significant amount of work to do. One of our greatest challenges lies in accumulating, confirming and loading public data before the site is officially launched. Design planning is well under way and will be completed quickly, when some anticipated funding is approved.

At this stage, we are also planning to incorporate an additional feature within the website entitled Mooroolbark

Directions. Mooroolbark Directions will house a database which will provide a rich source of qualitative and anecdotal information collected from local residents and organisations by MAP Mooroolbark members. A powerful search feature will enable users to filter thousands of responses to identify common themes, which will provide a potent tool for future township planning by the community in association with local government. The Directions page will be password protected, with users administered by the MAP Mooroolbark team.

In recent weeks, we've been grateful for your positive responses to the concept


of the website. All of us at MAP are excited about the potential usefulness of the site to all Mooroolbark residents, visitors and prospective residents.


Therapeutic Martial Arts Program

uiet achievers... Ordinary people, living

ordinary lives, affecting many of us in remarkable ways.

Let me tell you of one Mooroolbark family and the difference they've made. Albert and Kath Smith have lived in Mooroolbark since 1970. During their 55-year long marriage, they raised eight children. In spite of the constant demands of family and work commitments, the Smiths have demonstrated an unusual commitment to their belief in the importance of 'helping others'.

Albert has served the Lilydale Swimming Club (based at the Hawthory Road pool) since 1963, including a staggering 39 years on the Committee where he held every office except Treasurer and Secretary. Kath, likewise, was willing to take on all sorts of helpful roles. Each of their children swam for the Club. Both Albert and Kath have been awarded Life memberships of both the Lilydale Club, and also the Dandenong Ranges District Swimming Association. Kath served as the Chief District Judge for

14 years. In addition, as recognition of his community contribution, Albert received an Australia Day award from the Shire of Yarra Ranges in 2004.

During the 80s, the Lilydale Swimming Club almost folded. The Smith family responded as a unit! Albert became President and daughters Margo, Anita and Cheryl took over the respective responsibilities of Vice President, Secretary and Committee Member. Together, they focussed on building the Learn to Swim programme by employing trained instructors. Over time, they watched the Club grow again. Eventually, the Club moved to Hawthory Road, so that swimmers could train year-round in an

indoor, heated pool.

Although the Club has had its share of successes - at District and State levels - the Smiths' fondest memories are of the delighted expressions on children's faces following improved times... the involvement of families contributing together to the 'family club'... the thrill of being able to reassure young people of the importance of 'just doing your best' ...

At the Club centenary in 2003, Albert, along with co-author Rosemary Cullinan, launched their history of the Lilydale Swimming Club: From the Creek to the Dome. The book represented thousands of hours of painstaking research and writing.

Kath says: "He's always been attached to what he was doing... it had to be done right!"

Both appreciate the vital importance of volunteers in our community. Albert says: "You can't do without them, and you can't get enough!" In spite of busy lives involved with raising eight children Kath commented about volunteering that "there's always some time, you make some time... Go for it! You get out of it what you put into it!"


Albert still enjoys the "well-mannered, respectful young people" who gather around him whenever he visits a Club function. During the years my own family was involved with the swim Club, I enjoyed watching his great rapport with younger people.

Albert Smith - this 'gentle giant' - who in his youth during the Depression swam long-distance in his native Huon River in Tasmania - is now in his eighties! He's slowing down, but he still loves to be involved. Quite simply, he sums up his life: "I've always liked to help."

MOOROOLBARK TRADERS & Community Group



Eight years ago a few local traders formed the Mooroolbark Volunteer Traders Group to contribute to the day-to-day needs of the Mooroolbark Township. However, the group soon saw the value of involving additional community representatives, so the name was changed to Mooroolbark Traders & Community Group. It has been operating under that title for the past four years. As well as business people, its members include representatives from Connex Trains, Mooroolbark Police, the local shire and charitable groups, etc. Its mission is to care for our township. It seeks to help make Mooroolbark a safer and more aesthetic place in which to live, work and shop.



The group convenes on the 3rd Wednesday of each month at 7.30pm. Meetings are conducted in the Community Centre. Currently on the lookout for new blood and fresh ideas.

to call into their office, at Rocky the Cobbler, 40a Brice Avenue. Annual events include the Traders and Community Christmas Dinner, where the Raffle for the \$500 Christmas hamper is drawn. This fun-night is open to all community members. Regular Clean-up Moooroolbark events, organised by the group, have made a significant impact on the area. Fundraising throughout the year meets the cost of installing the Christmas decorations around the shopping area.

The group publishes a business directory once a year. The new one is out now and available in most shops. They also provide the Village News, which is a newsletter is designed to: give the traders the opportunity to directly advertise their

wares in the local area; inform the local residents of projects, events and activities taking place locally; and to raise funds for worthwhile projects to benefit the township.

Funds raised so far have contributed towards new Christmas decorations; the giant Christmas tree that is put in Brice Ave every year; a Gurney; and graffiti - remover solution. A current project envisages a new bus shelter area outside the station (pictured left), with a community directory board and provision for a community clock. Fund-raisers for this project include the recent Trivia Night. As we go to print, this project still has to be approved by the Shire.


NEW TO MOOROOLBARK Inspire Gifts & Homewares



Over 100 enthusiastic tree-planters gathered outside the Red Earth Room on Sunday 7th August to participate in our annual planting day. What's happening?



We might wonder if all the media attention to the Victorian government's initiative on values in schools a few months ago was a mere storm in a teacup. Fortunately, that is not the case.

lanning and implementation are proceeding apace, given additional impetus by the Commonwealth government's Values for Australian Schooling programme.

The Commonwealth Initiative

The challenge is being thrown out "for principals to engage their school communities in whole school change in relation to values education." This involves not only the school staff, students, parents, and others involved in the life of the school, but also members of the wider community so that it works into all areas of school life.

The values espoused in the Commonwealth programme are broadly defined areas from which schools can develop their own specifics. They

- Care & Compassion care for self and others
- Doing your Best seeking to accomplish something worthy and admirable, trying hard, pursuing excellence
- A Fair Go pursuing and protecting the common good where all people are treated fairly,
- Freedom enjoying all the rights and privileges of Australia and standing up for the rights of others
- Honesty & Trustworthiness being honest, sincere, and seeking the truth
- Integrity conducting oneself according to moral and ethical principles, ensuring consistency between words and deeds
- Respect treating others with consideration and regard, respecting another's point of view
- Responsibility being accountable for one's actions, resolving differences in constructive, non-violent and peaceful ways, contributing to society and civic life, taking care of the environment
- Understanding, Tolerance and Inclusion - being aware of others and their cultures, accepting diversity within a democratic society, being included and including others.

It is envisioned that individual schools will develop their own approaches along with their local communities and that these values will be transmitted to all students in every aspect of school life.

Values education is built around the principle that education is as much about building character as being equipped with particular skills. Based on these values, each school will build a School

Charter - its four-year mission with identified targets and goals encompassing the whole of the school's life and activity. This includes a review of the overall curriculum provision, the school's structures and policies, procedures and rules, funding priorities, decision-making arrangements, disciplinary procedures, community relations and their welfare and pastoral care approaches. All this is directed towards a positive climate for developing students' social and civic skills, their resilience and responsibility, in an environment safe and supportive for values education.

And in Mooroolbark . .

And right here in Mooroolbark, one of the pilot programmes is already under way. Recently the Red Earth Cluster (Bimbadeen Heights PS, Manchester Primary, Mooroolbark East Primary and Kilsyth Primary, along with Mooroolbark Secondary College) was awarded a three year Commonwealth funding grant to develop their Valuing Community - Taking Values into the Community programme. This is one of only five awarded in Victoria, twenty-six across Australia. The results of these will be disseminated Australia-wide to develop values education practice in all schools. So here we are in Mooroolbark - on the cutting edge.

The local project is being co-ordinated by the Red Earth Cluster educator, Robyn Floyd, and grew out of their State-funded Innovation & Excellence programme. As Robyn enthusiastically explained to us, this new Valuing Community - Taking Values into the Community programme envisions more active participation by schools and individual students in community life in both a positive and hands-on way. It is anticipated that projects (which are to be developed during Term 4) will take students into the community and draw the community closer to the schools. The details of the how and what are yet to be forged as the consultative process with the community gets under way. We are all encouraged to participate in this, with the first meeting coming up at the Mooroolbark Community Centre on September 13th. (See below).

Community Forum


The purpose of the forum is to discuss and explore the particular values (What kind? Which?) that should be integral to the project. These will be reflected in the planning and practice stages as they unfold next year within the community from each of the schools involved. This is a wonderful opportunity for all interested parties to make their contribution - not just to the schools but to our community life as a whole. This is an opportunity not to be missed for us to do our part in this most important aspect of our community's life.

Meanwhile, in smaller but no less significant ways the values programme continues to be developed in all the schools and we look forward to reporting more details of these in future issues.

FROM THE CHURCHES

id you see a recent Andrew Denton programme which featured an interview with three church pastors who were actively involved in working in their local communities? They represented different denominations but shared a common desire to "get out there and do something" – in the way they saw that Jesus did. Even though he openly admitted to not being a believer, Andrew obviously admired the dedication and self sacrifice of these three Christian leaders.

Andrew saw them as "buckers of the trend", willing to move outside their comfort zones to do some good. Which should give us some cause to pause and reflect. Has the very busy-ness of our lives taken over, preventing us from being engaged with the community around us? Are we out of touch, removed and unengaged? Or are we involved, even in some small way, in making a difference?

Jesus challenged his followers to be light to the world, not to be buried in our own lives but to be visibly and transparently there – to be salt for the earth, being part of making a discernible difference without having to blow a trumpet about it. The needs and opportunities are always there. We can start to be involved by just talking with our neighbours, with people already volunteering, or checking with the library, Community Centre or the Council offices. All sorts of churches and charities have many arms reaching out to help in their communities that could use your help.

That is the real challenge for all of us, here in Mooroolbark as well as the rest of Australia. We need to be consistently and wholeheartedly moving on that, just as those three pastors - inspired by the example of Jesus Christ. We can't all be as fully engaged as they are. But it doesn't have to be a lot to have a real effect, especially when more of us are involved.

The result? A healthier and happier community. And a healthier and happier life!

At the recent annual general meeting of the management committee, recognition was given to the major contribution that has been made by our Community Centre staff over the last four years. These staff members, in particular Sharon Turner and Marita Hearne, have borne the main load of the work behind the scenes, which has made the festival possible. Their efforts are much appreciated. In thanking the Community Centre staff, the elected co-chair-persons for the coming year, Peter Higgins and Randall Bourchier, noted the increased momentum within the community towards stepping up and taking up more of that load - a growing partnership that all would like to see extended.

It has been 18 months since Life Ministry Centre, partnered with the Northern Territory Christian Schools Association and the indigenous community of Gawa, which is located on a remote island off the top of Australia. Exciting times they have been.

We started to build a community kitchen, which was blown over by Cyclone Ingrid before it was completed. A cool room that was donated by Life Ministry Centre and ANZTEC Lilydale was also blown away, but fortunately we were able to rescue the motor which has been cleaned of sand and leaves and is ready to be put into the new cool room.

"The Gawa Elders have a vision for this new community that encompasses teaching the children their own culture alongside an education that will provide them with job skills".


We have been invited to assist with the job skilling and the setting up of the infrastructure. To do this, we have connected with volunteers here in Melbourne, who paid their own way to work alongside the Gawa community members, passing on their skills as they build. So far, the volunteers have been as diverse as teachers, carpenters, office workers, gardeners, scientists, community workers, and we must not forget the handymen and women prepared to put their hand to anything from painting to sewing school uniforms. Our next project will be to address the lack of consistent fresh water in preparation for the establishment

of fruit and veggie gardens to provide fresh produce for the community. The Elders plan for these gardens and orchids to then become a job stream for the teenagers as they leave school. The local men and women will be trained in garden skills as we go, as well as how to maintain any equipment needed.


Mooroolbark welcomes the Castleys
